New Equipment – Fundraiser

Some of you will remember Mr. Eamon McKieran's lecture last year. He outlined the work involved in more advanced orthodontic / maxilliofacial surgery. A new piece of equipment has since come on the market that will improve greatly how this work is carried out. The equipment allows much better profiles to be generated before and during treatment. The equipment costs 40K approximately. A number of avenues are being explored for covering the cost. The Association for its part has committed to getting involved. Operation Smile World Conference

Operation Smile hosted its 2006 world summit in Limerick on the 22-24th October. Operation smile is a volunteer medical services organisation providing free reconstructive surgery to children around the world including children with cleft lip and / or palate. The conference, held in Adare Manor courtesy of Tom & Judy Kane, brought together 130 leading authorities representing nearly 30 countries. New Graduate Nursing Programme

For some years CLAPAI has been invited by Our Ladies Hospital for Sick Children and Children's University Hospital to lecture as part of their postgraduate paediatric nursing programmes. The talks given have concentrated on a parent's experience – medical, emotional, practical. A number of volunteers have shared their experiences – each person with a different story. The feedback from students has always been positive.

This year, a new combined programme comes into affect. The programme is being run from UCD. The Association are delighted that CLAPAI is very much a part of the programme going forward even though the course duration has been reduced from 18months to 12 months. The first lecture of the new programme will be given in January.

Information Evening


